These counties encompass Local Workforce Investment Areas (LWIA) 25, 26 and a portion of 24.

Wayne County, Illinois

Wayne County is one of 102 counties in the State of Illinois. This county is seated in the City of Fairfield. In 2000, the total population of Wayne County was 17,151, with a median age of 39.9. According to U.S Census 2000, 99.5% of its population was reported as only one race, including 98.7% of these self-reported as White and 0.2% self-reported as African Americans. In 2006, the Per Capita Personal Income (PCPI) of Wayne County was \$27,150, ranked 57th in the state. This PCPI was 71% of the state average, \$38,409, and 74% of the national average, \$36,714. Average household size and average family size were 2.37 persons and 2.88 persons respectively in 2000.

Wayne County is located in southernmost Illinois, approximately 120 miles southeast of St. Louis, Missouri and 272 miles south of Chicago, Illinois. The county has a total area of 715.56 square miles, of which 713.90 square miles are land and 1.66 square miles are water.

The major cities and villages in Wayne County include Cisne, Fairfield, Golden Gate, Jeffersonville, Johnsonville, Keenes, Mount Erie, Sims, and Wayne City.





Age Group Distribution (2000)













Per Capita Personal Income (2001-2006)





Average Wage Per Job (2001-2006)




Average Wage Per Job of Wayne County (2006):




